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Postsecondary Needs in Kansas



Kansas needs **71%** of workers to have a postsecondary certificate or degree.

Approximately **36%** need to be bachelor degrees or higher

Approximately **35%** need to have a certificate or associate degree

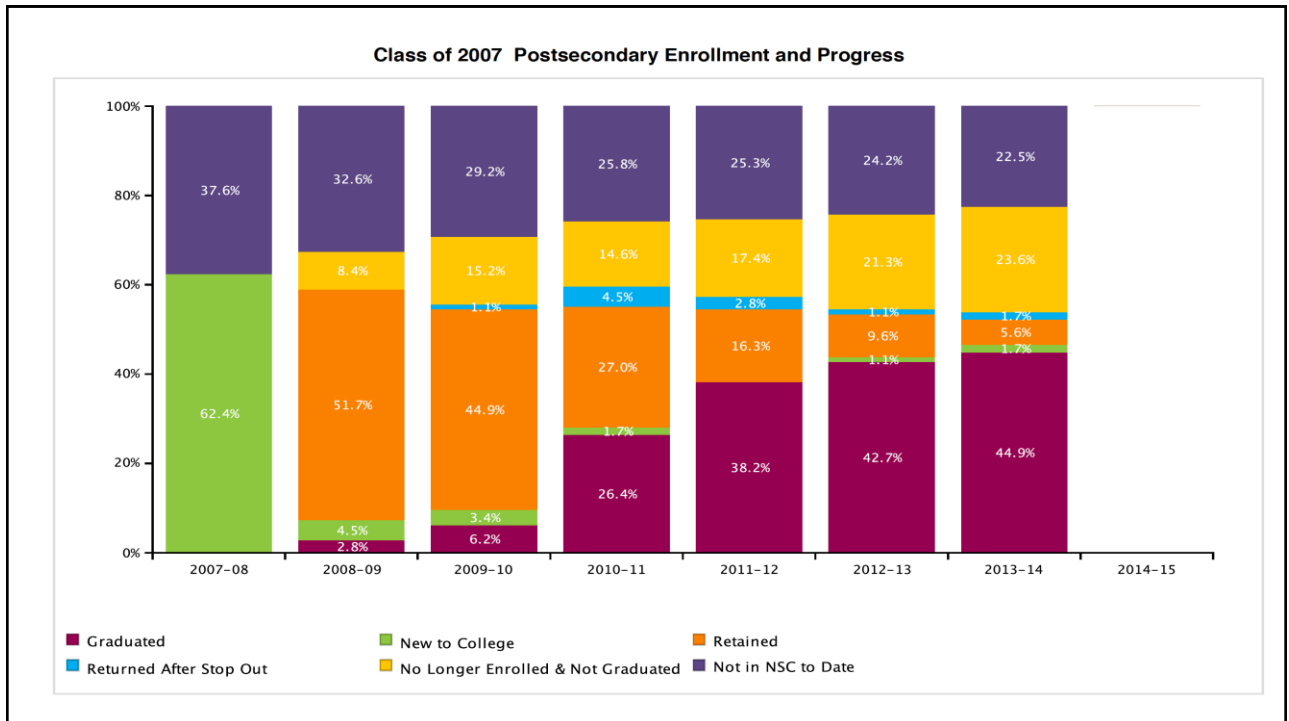


Postsecondary Success Data



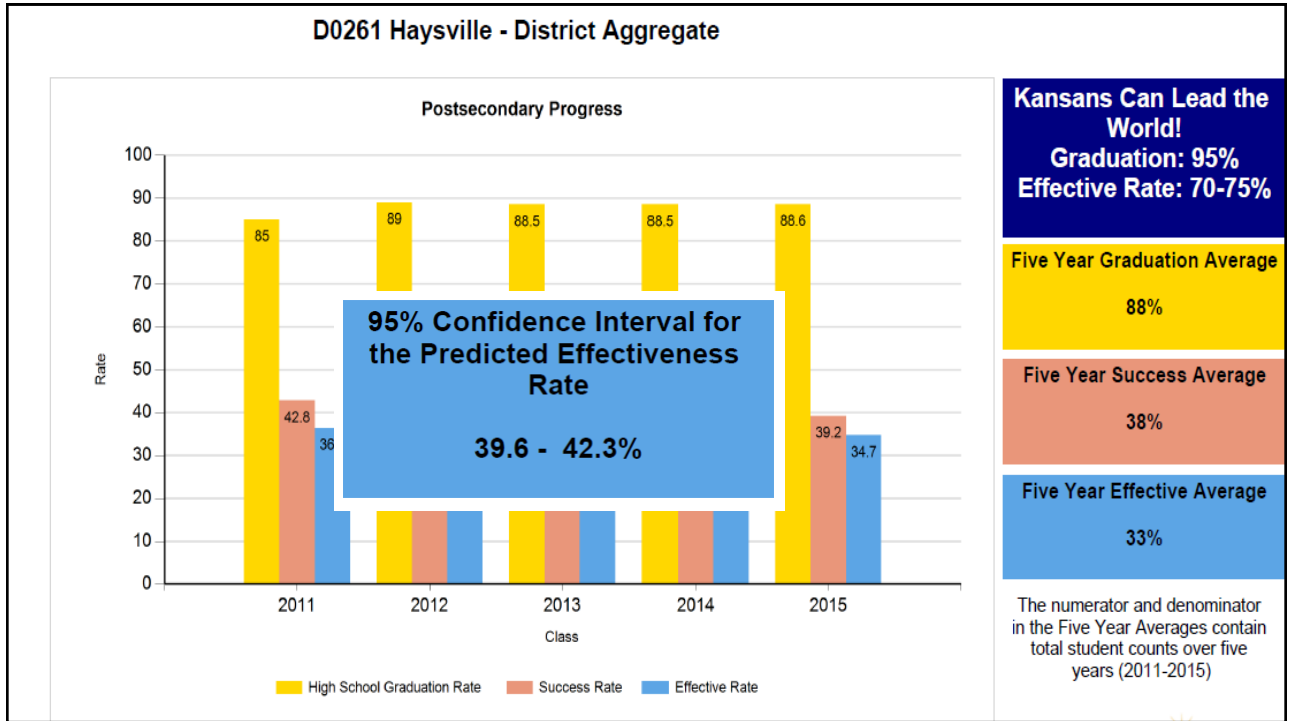
National Student Clearing House Data

- High School Graduates that enroll in postsecondary institutions.
- 4-year and 2-year postsecondary institutions, in-state and out-of-state.
- Does NOT include military, or students that directly enter the workforce.



Questions to Ask Ourselves

1. What do we know about the students in purple?
2. What do we know about the students in Yellow?
 - a. What courses did they take in high school?
 - b. What was the rigor of those courses?
 - c. Were they involved in extra-curricular activities?
 - d. Did they have an Individual Plan of Study?
 - e. Were their parents engaged in their learning?
 - f. What other questions might be important?

Goal

Beginning in the middle grades, each student develops an IPS that engages the student and family, and leads the student to a high school diploma and postsecondary success.

Individual Plan of Study (IPS)



Timeline

SY 17-18

- All middle (at least 8th grade) & high school students have an IPS

- 5 Year Average 😊

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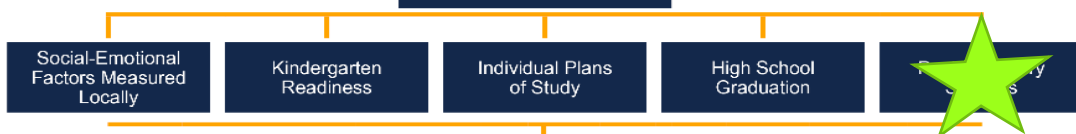


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
