Drug Free Schools

The Drug Free Schools and Communities Act requires that all staff, students and parents be notified of board drug policies. The Haysville Board of Education reviewed and approved the following policy on July 7, 2003.

JDDA Drug Free Schools

Maintaining drug free schools is important in establishing an appropriate learning environment for the district's students. The unlawful possession, use, sale or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students on school premises or as a part of any school activity is prohibited. This policy is required by the 1989 amendments to the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act, P.L. 102-226, 103 St. 1928.

JDDA-R Drug Free Schools

Student Conduct:

As a condition of continued enrollment in the district, students shall abide by the terms of this policy.

Students shall not unlawfully manufacture, distribute, dispense, possess or use illicit drugs, controlled substances or alcoholic beverages on school district property, or at any school activity. Any student violating the terms of this policy shall be reported to the appropriate law enforcement officials, and shall be subject to any one or more of the following sanctions:

1. First Offense. A first time violator shall be subject to the following sanctions:

- a. A punishment up to and including short-term suspension.
- b. Suspension from all student activities for a period of not less than one month.

2. Second Offense. A second-time violator shall be subject to the following sanctions.

- a. A punishment up to and including long-term suspension.
- b. Suspension from all student activities for a period of not less than one semester or four months.
- c. A student placed on long-term suspension under this policy may be readmitted on a probationary status if the student agrees to complete a drug and alcohol rehabilitation program. (Name(s) of acceptable programs are on file with the board clerk.)

3. Third and Subsequent Offenses. A student who violates the terms of this policy for the third time, and any subsequent violations, shall be subject to the following sanctions:

- a. A punishment up to and including expulsion from school for the remainder of the school year.
- b. Suspension from participation and attendance at all school activities for the year.
- c. A student who is expelled from school under the terms of this policy may be readmitted during the term of the expulsion only if the student has completed a drug and alcohol education and rehabilitation program at an acceptable program.

Students who are suspended or expelled under the terms of this policy will be afforded the due process rights contained in board policies and Kansas statutes, K.S.A. 72-8901, et seq. Nothing in this policy is intended to diminish the ability of the district to take other disciplinary action against the student in accordance with other policies governing student discipline. Drug and alcohol counseling and rehabilitation programs are available for students of the district. If a student agrees to enter into and complete a drug education or rehabilitation program, the cost of such program will be borne by the student and his or her parents. A list of available programs, along with names and addresses of contact persons for the programs, is on file with the board clerk. Parents or students should contact the directors of the programs to determine the cost and length of the program. A copy of this policy and a list of available drug and alcohol counseling programs shall be provided to all students and the parents of all students. Parents of all students shall be notified that compliance with this policy is mandatory.

GAOA Drug Free Workplace

Maintaining a drug free work place is important in establishing an appropriate learning environment for the students of the district. The unlawful manufacture, distribution, sale, dispensing, possession or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the district.

Family Rights And Privacy Act

Under the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), parents of students and eligible students (those who are 18 or older) are afforded various rights with regard to educational records which are kept and maintained by USD 261. In accordance with FERPA, you are required to be notified of those rights which include:

1. The right to review and inspect all of your educational records except those which are specifically exempt. Records will be available within 45 days of the day the district receives a request for access.

2. The right to prevent disclosure of personally identifiable information contained in your educational records to other persons with certain limited exceptions. Disclosure of information from your educational records to other persons will occur only if: 1) District has prior written consent for disclosure; 2) The information is considered "directory information" and no objection to release has been filed; or, 3) Disclosure without prior consent is permitted by law is, a) The district may disclose, without your consent, personally identifiable information to school officials with legitimate educational interest, and/or, the district shall disclose, without your consent, education records to officials of another school district in which a student seeks to enroll or intends to enroll. Two federal laws require local educational agencies receiving federal funding to provide military recruiters, upon request, with three directory information categories - names, addresses and telephone listings - unless parents have advised the school district that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent.

3. The right to request that your educational records be amended if you believe the records are misleading, inaccurate, or otherwise in violation of your rights. This right includes the right to request a hearing at which you may present evidence to show why the record should be changed if your request for an amendment to your records is denied in the first instance.

4. The right to file a complaint with the Family Policy Compliance Office at the U.S. Department of Education if you believe that USD 261 has failed to comply with FERPA's requirements. The address of this office is 400 Maryland Ave. SW, Washington, D.C. 20202-4605.

5. The right to obtain a copy of USD 261 policies for complying with FERPA. A copy may be obtained from the Superintendent of Schools, 1745 W. Grand, Haysville, KS 67060.

DIRECTORY INFORMATION: For purposes of FERPA, USD 261 has designated certain information contained in educational records as directory information which may be disclosed for any purpose without your consent. The following information is considered directory information: name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, the most recent previous school attended by the student, class designation, major field of study, and photographs. Such information may be used in publications such as yearbook, honor roll lists, playbills, web-site and newsletters.

If you do not want USD 261 to disclose directory information from your child's education records, you must notify the District in writing by September 14, 2007. Send such notification to: Superintendent of Schools, 1745 W. Grand, Haysville, KS 67060. If refusal is not filed, USD 261 assumes there is no objection to the release of the directory information as designated. Annual notification is given per District policy JRB approved by BOE on July 7, 2003.

COMPETITIVE SPORTS REQUIREMENTS

Any student planning on participating in competitive athletics is required to have a physical examination recorded on the Kansas State High School Activities Association physical form prior to trying out for any athletic team, cheerleading, and drill team. Physicals must be performed every school year. Forms are available at the Middle School and High School.

2007-08 Immunization Requirements

Kansas requires all children entering school for the first time in Kansas to provide their immunization records prior to admission to and attendance at a public school. A health assessment is now required for school entry for children through 9 years of age who have not previously enrolled in a Kansas school.

Immunization requirements for 5-18 year old students:

(1) Four doses of DTP/DtaP (diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis) with at least four weeks between each of the first three doses and at least six months between the third and fourth doses. If the last dose was given before the fourth birthday, one additional dose is required unless 6 doses have been given, a booster dose is required every ten years; (2) Four doses of Polio vaccine with at least 4 weeks between each dose, regardless of age. (3) Two doses of the MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) on or after the first birthday. There should be at least a four week interval between first and second doses; (4) One dose of Varicella with first dose on or after the first birthday (required through Grade 5), none needed if Varicella disease verified as follows: signature of physician indicating history of disease and date of illness, or signature of parent indicating history of disease and date of illness, or laboratory evidence of Varicella immunity; (5) Three doses of Hepatitis B (required through Grade 5) with a minimum of four weeks between first and second doses, eight weeks between the second and third doses and sixteen weeks between the first and third doses. The third dose must be given after twenty-four weeks of age.

Children 15 months to 4 years of age All children 15 months to 4 years of age must provide proof of having received at least the following immunizations prior to admission to and attendance at a public school: (1) Four doses of DTP/DTaP/DT (diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis) with at least four weeks between each of the first three doses and at least six months between the third and fourth doses; (2) Three doses of Polio vaccine with at least four weeks between each dose; (3) One dose of the MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) on or after the first birthday.

Students Currently Enrolled:

Students who need their 10 year TD (tetanus, diphtheria) booster for school entry for the 2007-2008 school year at the Middle School and Campus High School have been notified by mail. Students will need this booster prior to admission to school.

Age & Residence Requirements To Attend USD 261

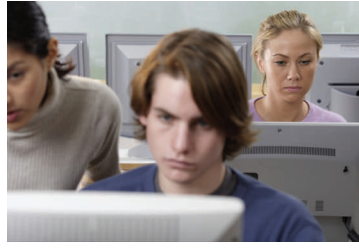
Pre-school: if eligible, 3 or 4 years on/before August 31
Kindergarten: five years old on/before August 31
First Grade: six year old on/before August 31

All new students entering Haysville USD 261, including pre-school and kindergarten, must have a certified copy of their birth certificate on file and a Kansas Certificate of Immunization. Students will be identified by their social security number. Please bring the student's social security card when enrolling. New to the district students must also show proof of residency. Acceptable proof of residence includes a current utility bill showing the student's address or a current rental or purchase agreement. Questions about residency should be referred to Debbie Coleman at 554-2200.

Immunizations Available During NEW STUDENT ENROLLMENT Day

The Sedgwick County Health Department will hold an immunization clinic at Haysville Middle School, 900 West Grand on Thursday, July 31 from 1:30-6:00 P.M. The clinic will see persons who are preschool through high school age. Anyone in need of any immunization can participate. Costs will be on a sliding scale based on family income as shown by recent paycheck stub. Participants will need immunization records, if available, and proof of current income. Both new students who are participating in the NEW STUDENT ENROLLMENT and current Haysville students who need to update their immunizations can use the service.
