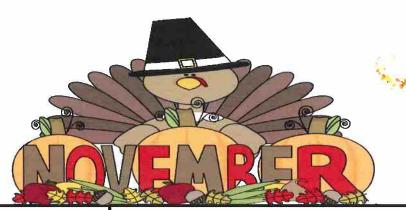

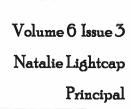

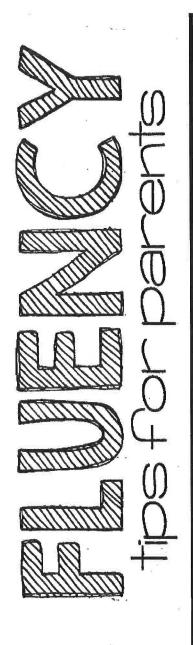
PICK UP/DROP OFF RULES

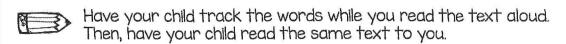
- *If you have to put your car in park and get out for any reason, please pull into a parking spot.
- *Please use the crosswalk to walk your students to the door or picking them up.
- *If your child needs help with a seatbelt, jacket, shoes, or your goodbye ritual including multiple kisses, hugs, tears, and secret handshakes, please pull into a parking spot.
- *Please do not park your car in the fire lane for any reason.
- *Please do not be on your cell phone during drop-off/pick-up.



*Parents should avoid standing in the RED area by the front door. This is our safety space for students and staff ONLY.







Allow your child to read his or her favorite books over and over again. Encourage your child to work on improving smoothness and reading with expression.

Read a page from a book aloud to your child. Then, have your child read the same page to you while trying to match his or her voice to yours.

Remind your child to look for periods and commas while reading and to briefly pause when coming to one of these punctuation marks.

Have your child read aloud as often as possible. Your child should be reading aloud to you at least once per day. He or she can read recipes, captions for a TV show, or signs seen when riding in the car. The possibilities are endless!

Provide your child with audio books to listen to so that he or she can hear fluent reading and become familiar with what it sounds like.

Make sure your child has access to books that he or she enjoys reading. He or she is more likely to want to practice reading if he or she has books they love. The public library is a great place to get books to read at home for free.

Most importantly, be positive and encourage your child. He or she may become easily frustrated with reading. Remind your child that you and his or her teacher are working closely together to help him or her become a better reader.

Pawsitively Teaching

Reading Fluency is defined as the ability to decode text with accuracy, automaticity and prosody, the appropriate use of phrasing and expression to convey meaning. That being said, why is this single reading component so highly recognized and emphasized in the field of reading education today? Research continues to reaffirm the importance of oral reading fluency and its correlation to increased reading comprehension. See below for some tips to encourage reading fluently and reading aloud at home.

The staff at Oatville encourages your child to read & practice their fluency at home-Whether at night, over the weekends, and on holiday breaks. Our hope is for your child to develop a life-long love of reading and learning!

Not only can we foster positive thinking and an attitude of gratitude, but your family will also learn more about each other as you continue to grow your team!



Affirm Daily! Practice growing as a family through positive affirmations. At dinner, or at some point during the day, give affirmations to each other and share the good things you see. Take it to the next level and think of someone outside of your family who you could affirm. Challenge each member of the family to handwrite a note to thank that person and send them in the mail.
