Principal's Newsletter

Dear Parents,

Season's Greetings from the staff and administration at Campus High School. As the holiday season approaches there are several important things that students need to remember. The fall semester will end on Tuesday, Dec. 20 at 2:55 pm. This means that students need to focus on the last few days of class. Assignments need to be turned in on time and preparation should be made for final exams. The semester grade is the grade that will be placed on the student's transcript so this is a very important time in our academic year.

First semester grades will be mailed home on Wednesday, January 4. If you have not received this report, please call the high school. You will also be able to look up your student's grades on Power School. This is an important report card because this is the grade that will be entered on your student's transcript. Grades at Campus are cumulative and reflect the entire semester's performance in a particular subject. These final grades translate into credits, which are required in order to graduate. In one semester, a student can earn 4.25 credits, i.e. .5 for each subject and .25 for seminar. Students must earn a specified number of credits to be classified as a sophomore (5), junior (11), senior (18). If a student is classified at a certain grade level he/she will remain at that level for the entire year. We do not change a student's classification during the school year. Therefore, passing classes is very important since graduation is based on students acquiring 25 credits plus .25 credit per semester for seminar. If students pass all of their classes in four years they will have a total of 34 credits including 2 seminar credits.

The winter sports season is now in full swing with boys and girls basketball, wrestling and boys swimming. Bowling will begin in January. There are many other activities that are taking place such as band, theater, vocal music and debate. I want to encourage you to come out and support our sports and activities programs. Our students need to know that the community supports them in all their endeavors.

When inclement weather causes the schools to close in our district, there will be an announcement made between 6:00 and 8:00 am. on local radio and television stations. All scheduled practices for extra-curricular and co-curricular school activities will be cancelled on days when school is closed for inclement weather.

Thank you for your support this semester. We look forward to working with you during the spring semester.

Christmas Break for students will begin December 21 and runs through January 2. December 21 and January 3 are inservice days for staff. Students will return on January 4 to begin second semester on a "BLACK" schedule.

Finals are scheduled for Dec. 15, 16, 19, & 20. It is very important that your student is here and ready to take finals. School will be dismissed at the regular time (2:55) on December 20.

Enrollment Conferences are scheduled for Feb. 15 and 16. Teachers will begin to contact parents the week or two in February to set up times to meet to get your students enrolled in the right classes for 2012-13 school year.

To Be Exempt From a Final

Final exams are scheduled for Dec. 15 (W2), 16 (B2), 19 (W1/3/4), & 20 (B1/3/4). On Dec. 19 & 20, the 2nd block class will be a study hall. Students will be required to be in all other classes Dec. 15 and Dec. 16 even if they are exempt from 2nd block finals.

All students must take final exams unless granted an exemption by their teacher. Exemptions are allowed only when a student has an average of at least 93%, four or fewer absences and teacher permission is granted. Each student received an exemption form and they are responsible for taking that form to each of the classes they will be ex-

empt from to be signed by the teacher. The form then must be signed by a parent or guardian prior to the absence being approved by Mr. Regier. Students are still required to attend the class during the final exam unless this form is properly filled out.

Students leaving school without this paperwork complete will be considered truant. Students who are exempt are not to be on school grounds during any part of the exempted class.

Students are required to sign out at the beginning of an exempted class and also to sign in when returning to school.

If your student is exempt from 1W and/or 3W on Dec. 19, they can be exempt from 2W (study hall) also. If your student is exempt from 1B and/or 3B on Dec. 20 they can be exempt from 2B (study hall) also.

All forms will be due by 3:30 on Wednesday, December 14 and will not be accepted after the deadline.

What If I Miss Final Exams?

Each semester, unforeseen circumstances, such as illness or family emergencies, arise that prevent students from attending school during final exams. Final exams will be given December 15, 16, 19, & 20. Should

your student be absent on those days, please contact the teacher to arrange a time to make up the exam prior to December 20. We have set aside a time for students to make up their exams on Wednesday, Decem-

ber 21 from 1:00-3:00. If you have any questions about this or any other issue, please call 554-2240 and ask to speak with your student's coun-

2nd Semester Schedules

Students were given their tentative 2nd semester schedules on November 28. They had until December 2 to request schedule changes. The counselors will respond to those requests during the last two weeks of the semester. Students pick up their final 2nd semes-

ter schedule before 7:50 a.m. on January 4 in their seminar classroom. There will be no schedule changes after January 4 **EXCEPT** for students that failed the prerequisite for a class on their schedule.

In January, Mrs. Voss, senior counselor, will visit 12th grade English classes to discuss financial aid. The students were given information in seminar about applying on-line. Seniors are reminded it is THEIR responsibility to fill out the FAFSA.

Graduation Progress

Is your senior student ready to graduate? If you are concerned, please call Mrs. Voss at 554-2240 to check on your

student's position. Due to their hard work over the last 3 years many seniors qualified for senior pass. Check your student's second semester schedule to see when they are required to be at Campus and when they are not. If credits are missing, there are two options to make up credits from last semester and/or previous semesters, they are classes at Clearwater Connection and P.A.S.S. courses. Check with Mrs. Voss for

details. First semester grades will be handed out in seminar on Jan. 4, so you should be checking for this grade card. In these remaining months, we must keep the lines of communication open between senior, parent, and Mrs. Voss. Each senior must have all required credits completed by May 17 to participate in graduation ceremonies on May 20.

School will not be in session Friday, January 13 for In-service and Monday, January 16 in observance of Martin Luther King Day.

Hearing/Vision Screening

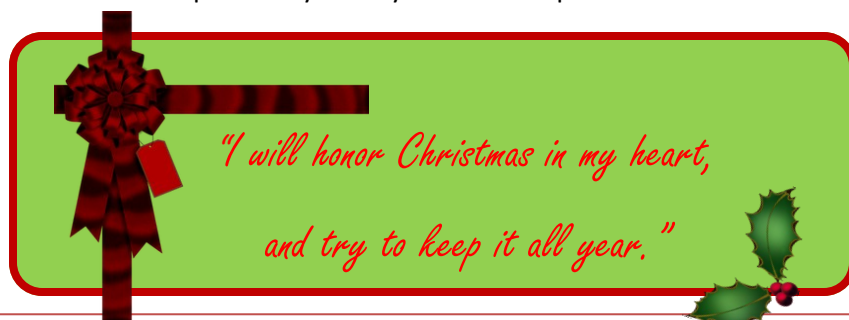
In February, health personnel will be doing hearing and vision screening of all 9th and 11th graders, special education students, and new students at Campus.

Debate News

The Campus High debate squad is nearing the end of a successful policy debate season: twenty-four experienced and eighty first-year debaters have represented Campus in over 840 rounds of debate in thirty-three tournaments through December 6. The season concludes January 13-14 at the state tournament at Olathe Northwest. Each school is allowed a maximum of four entries in the two-speaker division (Campus has qualified 10 individuals or 5

teams). State qualifiers include seniors Joey Alligier, Ashley Bruner, Robert Schmeidler, and Luke Thompson; juniors Vivian Agnew, Joseph Lantz, and Gabby Yeager; and sophomores Gabby Griffie, Jamie Welch, and Robert Youel. In addition the top two schools at the regional 4-speaker tournament on December 17 will advance to state. Campus competes in the Valley Center regional.

Also, our National Forensic League chapter is the largest it's ever been with 328 memberships and degrees on record in the national office. We lead the Sunflower district in both total memberships and degrees and in new memberships and degrees (106). That latter total places us fourteenth in the nation in new memberships and degrees and third in Kansas, behind two Blue Valley schools.

Stuco Win Awards

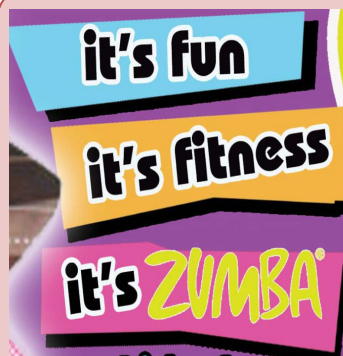

Campus Robotics Team Qualifies for Regionals

For the third year in a row the Campus Robotics Team has placed third in the annual B.E.S.T competition at WSU's Koch Arena. B.E.S.T (Boosting Engineering, Science and Technology) is an annual competition for high school students in the mid-west. Twenty-nine schools from Kansas competed on Saturday, Nov 5th. Nationally more than 700 schools com-

pete. The top six schools from each hub progress to one of three regional competitions. Campus will next compete against 65 schools from Missouri, Oklahoma, Kansas and Arkansas at the Frontier Trails Regional in Ft Smith, Arkansas. Campus last qualified for the regional event two years ago and finished in the upper third at Ft Smith. The B.E.S.T competition exposes students to real world challenges that working Engineers and Scientists encounter daily. The students have

limited time and resources to complete their designs. Engineering mentors assist the students with solving the design challenges. The B.E.S.T award is presented based upon four areas. The first area is a written notebook documenting the student's design and strategy. The second is a live oral presentation by the students in front of a panel of judges about their design. Thirdly the students are judged on an informational booth that is displayed during the game day and staffed by the students to answer questions from the public. Finally the students are judged on how well their robot performs during the game. This year's game scenario was that mutant bugs had escaped the lab, needed to be recovered and placed in storage containers. The students had six weeks to design and build a robot that they could control remotely. The students completed nine rounds. Each round was timed and the students had only 3 minutes to complete as much of the task as possible. Campus placed 5th in the game competition. Questions cover alcohol, drugs, tobacco, and family & community factors related to substance use and abuse.

I feel that the survey is a worthwhile undertaking that will help create better, more effective programming to combat the problem of alcohol and drug use by youth in our community. I hope that you will agree to allow your child to participate in this statewide effort. If you agree, you need to do nothing further. However, if for any reason you do not wish your child to participate, please complete and return the attached denial of permission slip to Campus High School by Dec. 12 for seniors and Dec. 19 for all underclassmen, and your child will be excused from participation.

White Bean Basil Chicken Chili

1 lb. boneless chicken breast	2 (15½ oz.) cans Great Northern Beans
1 medium onion	4 c. low-sodium chicken broth
2 cloves garlic	1½ tsp. chili powder
1 medium tomato	1½ tsp. cumin
1 large lime	½ tsp. dried oregano
1 T. fresh basil	½ tsp. salt
2 T. canola oil	⅛ tsp. ground black pepper

Optional Ingredients: 2 tsp. red pepper flakes; ¼ c. fresh cilantro leaves

1. Remove any skin from the chicken breast, Cut chicken into 1/2 inch cubes.
2. Peel, rinse, and finely chop onion. Peel and mince garlic.
3. Rinse tomato, lime and basil.
4. Remove tomato core and seeds, then chop tomato. (This process is called concasse.)
5. Cut lime in half and squeeze juice of one half of the lime into a bowl. Discard any seeds.
6. Finely chop basil.
7. Drain and rinse beans in a colander.
8. In a large saucepan or soup pot, cook onion and garlic in oil over medium heat until onion is tender, about 5 minutes. If the onion or garlic start to brown, lower the heat.
9. Add chicken, beans, broth, spices, tomato, lime juice, and basil to pot and bring to a boil.
10. Reduce heat, cover, simmer for one hour, stirring occasionally.
11. Top with red pepper flakes and rinsed and chopped cilantro, if using.

Chef's Notes:

- Use Thai basil for an East meets Southwest flavor.
- Serve over a bed of cooked greens like spinach, kale, or chard or serve over rice.
- Try substituting other canned beans, like Kidney, cannellini, or pinto, for the Great Northern Beans.
